

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

STATEMENT OF RECONCILIATION

Mother Teresa Middle School – Statement on Reconciliation Regina: February 17, 2016

2015 marked a historic time in Canada with the publication of the Final Report of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) of Canada and the establishment of the National Centre for Truth and Reconciliation at the University of Manitoba. The Mother Teresa Middle School Board as well as its staff and entire school community, profoundly respect the Commission's work and acknowledge the sorrowful legacy of residential schools with respect to Indigenous peoples, cultures, spiritualties and families.

The decisions, policies and actions which led to the legacy of residential schools must never be repeated in this country. The Commission calls institutions and Canadians from all walks of life to take actions that contribute, in a practical way, to reconciliation of Indigenous and non-Indigenous Canadians. Mother Teresa Middle School is committed to doing its part.

Mother Teresa Middle School (MTMS) is working hard to be sensitive to this historical context and to build trust with all communities with whom we will work. We are committed to participating in meaningful and lasting change and creating a peaceful and respectful relationship with parents, students, and communities while building a better Canada.

MTMS is a school for students from low income families who live predominantly in the North Central and Core areas of Regina. It accepts students of all faiths, ethnic and cultural backgrounds. This includes Indigenous, new-Canadian and other visible minorities. We recognize that the neighbourhoods we serve are home to organizations and community leaders whose work and contributions are incredible examples of resiliency and reconciliation that are strengthening our city for everyone. MTMS's model of additional supports, programming and long-term educational commitment reflects the longstanding values and traditions in these neighbourhoods.

Leaders from Indigenous and non-Indigenous communities have graciously provided their advice and expertise upon start-up of the school and continue to do so today. They have reminded us of the TRC's findings with respect to the sorrowful legacy of residential schools and also of the important challenge it provides all Canadians: "to establish new relationships embedded in mutual recognition and respect that will forge a brighter future."

MTMS is inspired by Catholic and Jesuit values according to the "Nativity" school tradition and the spirit of reconciliation. It operates inclusively, being open to a variety of cultural traditions and expressions of spirituality including Christian and Indigenous traditions. MTMS does not proselytize, or aim to "convert" students of non-Catholic backgrounds. While students will be expected to participate in lessons, ceremonial activities and celebrations held throughout the school year, accommodation can and will be made for any student's additional spiritual needs in a way that is respectful of their own and other students' backgrounds. It is the hope of all involved in Mother Teresa Middle School that all students will be exposed to a breadth of spiritual traditions and practices from all walks of life.

The concern for a holistic education is seen as part of a Jesuit endorsed school's mission, "to develop men and women for others", where we will support our students of all cultural and faith backgrounds becoming hopeful, confident, morally responsible leaders for love and service of their families and communities. MTMS will strive to encourage our students to become people who are loving, intellectually competent, open to growth, spiritually alive and committed to doing justice. These five key aims are common to all Jesuit schools. MTMS will strive to create a school culture of individual care and concern for each student – where students feel they are known and cared for by their teachers, where they feel respected and where they learn to respect themselves and others and learn a sense of responsibility for serving their community.

Concern for the spiritual development of our students is seen as part of providing a holistic education which also attends to students' academic preparation, physical health and general wellness, and development of social skills. MTMS does not follow the traditional approach to teaching religion. Instead Catholic and Christian beliefs and spiritual practices will be infused into the overall curriculum and school practices. Teaching about and showing respect

for other faiths, beliefs and traditions including Indigenous beliefs, and prayer practices are also included in curricula and the school day. In keeping with the mandate of the Truth and Reconciliation Report, MTMS teaches curriculum regarding the residential school legacy in Canada as well as the Catholic Church's role in its development and delivery.

MTMS's goal of encouraging students to be "spiritually alive" means to help them learn to respect their own faith and spiritual traditions, to understand where they come from and who they hope to become and to also learn to respect other faiths and traditions. We will encourage the understanding that we are all Treaty people and that we need to nurture a relationship of mutual care and support between Indigenous and non-Indigenous people. As suggested in the TRC Report, Indigenous Studies will be part of the curriculum and we will continue to seek the support of Indigenous educators and consult Indigenous elders with respect to this curriculum and Indigenous spiritual teachings and practices.

Finally, we endorse and encourage the Calls to Action of the TRC Report with respect to education and also with respect to how we treat each other: that "reconciliation must become a way of life" and that it is "about respect — both self-respect for Aboriginal people and mutual respect among all Canadians." We understand that we will need to continue to learn from the community and our students as we embark together on our educational journey. The TRC Report concluded, "Establishing respectful relationships involves learning to be good neighbours. This means being respectful—listening to, and learning from, each other; building understanding; and taking concrete action to improve relationships." Our commitment at Mother Teresa Middle School is to put that conclusion into action. It is an incredible privilege and responsibility — and it is essential for our city, for our province and for future generations.

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

In 2017-18, the Mother Teresa Middle School (MTMS) team continued to cultivate the strong culture of MTMS that is deeply rooted in the Catholic Faith, Ignatian and Traditional Indigenous Spirituality and the rich traditions of Jesuit Education.

Intentional leadership, servant leadership and heroic leadership are frameworks the MTMS team has embraced over the last three years to individually and collectively live out the mission, vision and values of MTMS. The book *Heroic Leadership* by Chris Lowney was used to inspire both our staff and students to lead in ways unexpected. The four pillars of the heroic leadership framework are: **STRIVING for the MAGIS, EYES that see the POSSIBILITIES, A MIND that knows ITSELF and A HEART that LOVES DEEPLY.** Together, our goal is to create a sustainable culture and develop future leaders in both staff and students.

MTMS honoured the Truth and Reconciliation Calls to Action in ways that are beginning to authentically permeate our school culture, faith formation, curriculum and programming. At the

heart of our school based learning improvement plan was a continued and intentional response to the Truth and Reconciliation Education Calls to Action #10; developing culturally appropriate curricula; enabling parents to fully participate in the education of their children and respecting and honouring the treaty relationships.

The MTMS team continued to learn from and grow in relationship with local Elders. The two Sweat Lodge Ceremonies, held this year, gave both staff and students an opportunity to pray and heal together. Elder Dennis Omeasoo and Elder Harry Francis lead our staff retreat sharing traditional stories and preparing a Sweat Lodge Ceremony at Piapot Reserve. Our MTMS staff retreat was a deeply moving spiritual experience. Six staff members were gifted with Spirit Names: Ron ~ Sweet Grass Man; Jane ~ Good Sounding Sky Woman; David ~ Yellow Bear; Greg ~ He Walks With Painted Horses; Liz ~ Beautiful Raven Woman; Becky ~ Dancing Eagle Woman.

Year Two of the Bringing Back the Buffalo project engaged students, their families and MTMS staff in the fleshing of a second buffalo hide that will be used as a canvas for pictographs that will depict the important moments in the MTMS story. Wayne Goodwill, from Standing Buffalo First Nation, is the artist that will be commissioned to create the images in collaboration with MTMS students in 2018-2019. Under the direction of local Indigenous artists Lorne Kequahtooway and Joely BigEagle-Kequahtooway, a select group of MTMS students hosted their first student art show in Hill Tower II. These students had an opportunity to share their beading talents and exercise their entrepreneurial spirit while engaging with the business community in downtown Regina.

The MTMS Buffalo Boys drum group has grown significantly over the last two years. This group of young men have grown in their ability to sing and drum, but more importantly they are discovering and embracing their cultural identity, feeling a sense of belonging and optimism. The MTMS Buffalo Boys have given of their time and talent a multitude of times this year including opening "We Day" at Campbell Collegiate, performing at the Tim Horton's Regional Meetings, drumming at half time at the USPORT Women's Basketball Tournament held at the University of Regina and participating in the Multi-Cultural half time show at a Saskatchewan Roughrider football game. A highlight for the Buffalo Boys, to cap the year, was participating in the Pasqua First Nation #79 Traditional Powwow in August.

It has become increasingly evident that mental health and wellness is affecting academic outcomes along with overall health and well-being while students are at MTMS and more profoundly when moving to high school. We are looking at using the PEAR Survey as part of our MTMS Multiple Measures of Data to create Responses to Intervention that will have a direct impact on mental health and wellness and will affect academic and overall well-being outcomes in positive ways. We are leading in this area and the first school in Canada to use the survey.

Our NWEA international academic assessment data is showing that we have significant work to do to prepare our students for academic success at MTMS and in high school. The gap in student learning continues to be one of the major challenges for our academic staff. Growing our students two years or more in one year is always a goal we are striving for. We are using our data to inform our instructional practices in order to create learning experiences that meet the individual needs of all of our students. At a glance, this comparative data, is where our students are collectively testing on their international assessments in Mathematics, Reading and Language Usage. We continue to embrace a "growth mindset".


MTMS OurSchool Spring Data is showing us that 82% of our MTMS students are interested and motivated in their learning compared to the Canadian Norm that is 52%. 86% of our students are trying hard to succeed in their learning; this is on par with the Canadian Norm. Eight of ten students feel important concepts are taught and evaluated well. Eight out of ten students find classroom instruction relevant to their everyday lives. Eight of ten students find the classroom instruction is well-organized, with a clear purpose, and with immediate and appropriate feedback that helps them learn. The MTMS data is above the Canadian Norm in these three areas. 62% of our female students have moderate to high levels of anxiety in comparison to 20% of the boys. Our demographic collectively is more than twice the percentage of the Canadian Norm with regard to anxiety which is significant when aligning mental health and wellness to academic outcomes.

Growing "Men and Women for Others" is at the root of our mission at MTMS. In response to a global read aloud focusing on the book *A Long Walk to Water*, by Linda Sue Park, MTMS students and staff participated in an event organized by our academic staff called **Walk for Water**. Students and staff, in teams of six, carried eleven gallon jugs of water, proudly donated by Culligan. The walk took place at Wascana Park. Students raised \$230 to build wells in South Sudan. Our Grade 6 students continued to build relationships by singing, dancing and playing games with the Elders of the Eden Care Lutheran Home which is located just down the street from Mother Teresa Middle School. For the seventh year in a row, and in the true Spirit of Christmas, MTMS staff and students partnered with MLTAikins to bag rice for the Regina Food Bank.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S MESSAGE

The 2017-18 school year was a year of firsts. Our first cohort of students that started at Mother Teresa Middle School (MTMS) in 2011 as a group of bright eyed Grade 6's, graduated from high school. Eleven of sixteen students in that class graduated on time with four students needing a little more time to complete their high school standing. One student did not finish their high school requirements and is working. The 2017-18 school year was also the first year we had a full compliment of students in Grades 6-12. It was also the first year that our MTMS students had the opportunity to apply to post-secondary institutions and attempt to secure scholarships and bursaries. Our College and Careers Coaches worked very hard to help students make the transition to post-secondary and obtain access to band funding when possible. Our College and Careers Coaches helped our students choose programs and classes that appealed to them, helped them move away from home and navigate large universities and busy class schedules. They helped students purchase textbooks and access key supports available to them on campus and off. Ten of the eleven students from our first cohort were accepted into post secondary institutions and we couldn't be more proud.

The 2017-18 school year also saw the return of our *The Sky's the Limit* event. The event was reimagined as an event to honour our first group of high school graduates. It was an amazing night, held at the Doubletree Hotel and included students, parents, volunteers, board members, donors and mentors. We also took time during the event to announce *The MacKay Family Bursary*, generously created by good friends Harold and Jean MacKay. The bursary was made possible through a \$130,000 gift to MTMS and will ensure that the AR reading program lives on at the school, with the remaining amount going towards supports for our graduates as they pursue their passions. The night also saw MTMS recognize and honour five very special friends of the school. Star quilts were presented to Laurie Powers and Reverend Doctor John Meehan for their commitment and service to the MTMS Board of Directors, Harold and Jean MacKay for their financial support of the school and their ongoing volunteerism and advocacy and Maurice Laprairie for his ongoing work as a volunteer, mentor and donor to the school. It was an incredible night of celebration, friendship and story-telling.

In the middle school, our students continued to excel and discover who they are. In May, we were blessed to have **Father General, Arturo Sosa SJ**, visit from his home in Rome as well as **Mr. Danny Perez**, Executive Director of the NativityMiguel Coalition visit from New York. We once again had the privilege of taking our students to Tim Horton's Camp in Kananaskis for a week and Mr. Perez was able to accompany us and experience the Rocky Mountains for the first time.

Looking forward, the data has shown that we need to focus a little more on the mental health of our students. With that, we embarked on a three-year partnership with the PEAR Institute and the MacLean Hospital in Boston, that will help us identify and address nineteen areas of mental health for our students. I would like to thank the MTMS Board of Directors for making this partnership possible and for

It is a great feeling and exciting to know that MTMS has wrapped up another year. I am proud and honoured to work with a passionate team that believes in the MTMS mission and is committed to following our student's right up toward employment!

In the 2017-18 school year, there were 66 former MTMS students at eleven different high schools including, Luther College High School, Athol Murray College of Notre Dame, Dr. Martin Leboldus High School, Balfour Collegiate, Martin Collegiate, Miller Comprehensive Catholic High School, Archbishop M. C. O'Neill High School, Aden Bowman Collegiate, Scott Collegiate, St. Luke Alternate, and Regina Catholic Online Learning.

The Student Support Team (SST) continues to work together to connect with students, monitor attendance and oversee high school academics. We continue to meet with the administrators, teachers, and counsellors. Transportation continues to be a barrier for many of our students. The SST continues to navigate and problem solve in this area. Meeting families in their homes when needed continues to be a high priority in order to create a team atmosphere. We have realized over the years that a strong team bonding with families makes the student much more successful in high school and creates a positive experience for everyone.

The MTMS Grade 8 Transition Program starts in September even though the students will graduate the following June. Early intervention and being pro-active helps the students discern where the best place is for them to go to high school. High School tours and visits start in November and continue until March. Students are able to visit public, separate and private high schools.

It is also very important that we stay connected with the students as they enter Grade 9. The new building and surroundings can be overwhelming. Together, we monitor and continue to goal set for all of the students in regards to attendance, homework, study time, extra-curricular involvement and providing supports to them and their families.

Everyday our students deal with fitting in, building relationships, adjusting to a new timetable and classrooms that are double in size. Our team will continue to problem solve and help students overcome their fears that come with their educational journey.

We understand that all students are unique, what works for one student may not work for another so the SST team needs to adapt and continue to be flexible.

Some of the highlights of the 2017-18 year were:

528 Graduate Support visits made to our high school students 87.2% attendance rate for high school students 20 students held summer jobs (summer 2018)

I am very proud of the MTMS Student Support Team as they have many strengths and talents. The team continues to go, "above and beyond" in helping our students succeed. We will continue to take one day at a time and do "whatever it takes" in order to have students reach their full potential.

Mother Teresa's quote, "Do things for people not because of who they are or what they do in return, but because of who you are", fits the passion and character of the MTMS Graduate Support Program.

HIGH SCHOOL

The transition to high school from Mother Teresa Middle School (MTMS) continues to be a learning experience. 2017-18 was the fourth year getting students ready for Grade 9 and although they often face struggles and challenges, they continue to problem solve and embrace all that comes with the student's journey.

The 2017-18 was also MTMS' fourth year partnering with good friends at MLT Aikins. MLT Aikins gave a bursary of \$10,000 for students needs such as food, school supplies, dorm needs, band fees, athletic equipment and other miscellaneous items to help make high school a positive experience.

The Student Supports Team (SST) continues to monitor high school student's attendance and academic records on a daily basis. This data is so vital as the SST strive to be pro-active and meet the needs of students throughout the semester. It is also important not only to share data and information with the students, but the families - so everyone is working in unity, striving for the same goal of on time graduation for their son/daughter.

In the fourth year of transition, there is much to celebrate. Ten out of sixty-five students made the honour roll at their respective high schools. Many students continue to participate in extra-curricular activities such as volleyball, basketball, football, wrestling, rugby, and track and field. Four students played for a city championship football team. Two Grade 12 students at Notre Dame captured the city and provincial rugby championships with their respective teams. Two Grade 12 students from Luther College High School traveled to El Salvador on a reverse mission trip with their school. One Grade 10 student traveled with their high school to Boston, Washington and New York to learn about history and current events. One student signed a contract with a professional modelling agency and had her first paid runway experience, along with several professional photo shoots.

All of the activities the students become involved in at the school, enabled them to be more engaged in the culture of their school giving them more confidence and self-esteem.

The MTMS Mentoring Program continues to play a key role in helping students succeed. Contact between the mentors and students continues throughout high school and MTMS certainly appreciates the extra attention the students receive from trusting, caring adults. Whether it is going for lunch, a coffee visit, attending a hockey game, helping with homework or cheering them on at an activity, students are made to feel important.

The first cohort of students who started at Mother Teresa Middle School in September of 2011 were in Grade 12 this past year. Eleven out of sixteen graduated from their respective high schools, on time. One student is currently working, one student is continuing to attend at Scott Collegiate and the other three will complete their high school at Regina Public Schools Adult Campus. Ten of the eleven who graduated on time started at a post-secondary institution in September and one moved to Montana to live with her mother.

Relationships will continue to be the key to success with the students in high school. MTMS is blessed to have many networks. They will continue to give students hope and work diligently every year toward, on time high school graduation for all MTMS students. It is indeed exciting times for the MTMS community.



BRINGING BACK THE BUFFALO is about connecting land, language, cultural teachings and traditional spirituality in beautiful ways.





Pillar One—Academic Excellence (Key Lead—Principal)

Goal: To develop a rigorous and balanced curriculum with a focus on 21st century skills that include creativity, collaboration, communication, critical thinking and technology.

<u>Our version of the OurSCHOOL</u> student survey measures 33 indicators based on the most recent research on school & classroom effectiveness. This report provides highlights based on data from 55 students in this school that participated in the survey between May 8, 2018 to May 14, 2018.



- ↑ 91% of MTMS students had a higher rate of participation in sports compared to the Canadian norm of 69%.
- ↑ 82% of MTMS students were interested & motivated in their learning compared to the Canadian norm of 52%.
- ↑ 7.5 out of 10 MTMS students rated advocacy at school compared to the Canadian norm of 4.7 out of 10.
- ↑ 8 out of 10 MTMS students rated positive teacherstudent relations compared to the Canadian norm of 7.6 out of 10.

The Grade 8's grew 3.5 years in 3 years collectively in Math, Language Usage and Reading as measured by the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) Measure of Academic Progress (MAP).

1.3 Year

The Grade 6's grew 1.3 year in their first year at MTMS collectively in Math, Language Usage and Reading as measured by the Northwest <u>Evaluation Association (NWEA) Measure of Academic Progress (MAP)</u>.



- ↓ 64% of MTMS students had a high sense of belonging compared to the Canadian norm of 80%.
- ↓ 44% of MTMS students had moderate to high levels of anxiety, the Canadian norm was 15%.
- ↓ 33% of MTMS students were victims of moderate to severe bullying in the previous month, the Canadian norm was 23%
- → 39% of students in this school met or nearly met Canada's Food Guide, the Canadian norm for these grades is 56%.
